- Offers rural CBOC (Community-Based Outpatient Clinic) and other VA clinicians access to specialty care in geriatrics using telehealth modalities
 - Inter-professional clinical consultation
 - Video telehealth to rural CBOCs and to home
 - Ongoing case-based training/Case Conference Series








Activities of Daily Living (Grooming/Bathing/Dressing etc.)






Overall Number of Hits Per Category Per Month

Mr. Bing



Get To Know Mr. Bing

Mr. Bing is a 68 y.o. retired air force Veteran who lives in a rural town in Arizona with his wife and dog, Gray. He is a 2-hour drive to the local VA hospital.

PMH: diabetes and hypertension, BP 150's/70's.

Medications: Metformin, Lisinopril and Simvastatin.

Occupation: Part-time cashier

Hobbies: volunteering at a soup kitchen, landscaping his yard, taking care of his dog, and visiting sister that lives 1 hour away.

Mr. Bing has a supportive family with a wife and two daughters. One daughter lives locally and the other lives in California.



Changes In Memory

Over this past year Mr. Bing started to notice some changes to his memory.

- He is forgetting why he went into a room and misplacing items.
- He takes longer to complete everyday tasks and is has trouble balancing the cash register.

- Mrs. Bing agrees and has noticed additional changes in Mr. Bing's memory over the past 6-8 months as well
- He normally is the planner for their family, managing finances and does most of the grocery shopping however, he is been having more difficulty completing these tasks.

Recent Incidents

Mr. Bing's financial errors at work were substantial enough that he was terminated from his job

He also recently got lost driving to his sister's house, which is a familiar route. He pulled over at a gas station and had to call his wife for directions.



Cognitive Evaluation

After hearing about his symptoms, his PCP referred him for a neuropsychological assessment. Mr. Bing was diagnosed with Mild Cognitive Impairment (MCI).

The family does not know much about MCI or dementia.

"I've noticed a big change in his memory. He keeps asking me about my job even though he knows I quit last year. I don't know what is gong on with him"

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



Pressing Concern: Driving



OT Driving Evaluation

Displayed safe driving behavior

Suggested to drive only short distances, familiar areas, and during the day

Mrs. Bing will now take over the drives to visit his sister and daughter.

The team will continue to monitor this situation closely



Mr. Bing is now 73 years old, and his MCI has progressed to dementia

- More difficulty managing medications
- Leaves food in the microwave and has left the stove on a few times
- Can't figure out how to make outgoing calls on his smartphone
- More suspicious and paranoid of others. He is quick to anger and often accuses his family of misplacing his wallet and taking his money
 - His home is cluttered as he is exhibiting hoarding behavior










• Mr. Bing is on 7 different medications, but he often refuses to take them



Mr. Bing's family realized that they have not had a goal of care conversation or completed necessary documents:

- Healthcare Proxy
- Power of Attorney
- Living will

They were given a stack of documents and instructed to complete and bring them into their next doctor's visit



- Mrs. Bing is the sole caretake for Mr. Bing and she is starting to feel overwhelmed
- Her daughters helps every now and then but the every day responsibilities fall to her
- His family is exhausted from arguing with him daily while trying to complete his daily routines, especially bathing
- They can't leave Mr. Bing alone anymore as he is at risk for falls in the home and has been unsafe in the kitchen numerous times.

After seeing a big decline in Mr. Bing's function and quality of life, the family would like to speak to his PCP for another Goals of Care conversation


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
